The red-haired bordello proprietress was granted a writ of habeas corpus yesterday by the State Supreme Court in San Francisco. The court ordered her released on \$2000 bail pending a final hearing at 10 a.m. Oct. 3 in Los Angeles.

Reilly Sees No 'Cohens' Elsewhere

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 1 (P)—The State Board of Equalization's new chairman -George Reilly of San Francisco-today uncorked a verbal barrage aimed directly at William C. Bonelli, Los Angeles, who resigned as Board head Aug. 18.

Bonelli, when he resigned, charged liquor interests had "double-crossed" the Board by foisting on it State laws which hampered enforcement.

'Plagued by Cohen'

Reilly today asserted: "In my 11 years on the Board, there has been only one black spot in the administration and enforcement of the State liquor

"That black spot is Los Angeles County (Bonelli's district.)
"The rest of the State doesn't seem to be plagued by Mickey Cohen and his ilk." (Bonelli charged that existing State laws made it difficult to crack down on

nen like Cohen.) Reilly said the creation of a separate board to handle liquor law enforcement will not solve

the State's problems in that field.

Bone of Contention Bonelli has been plumping for such a separate board since last winter and the issue has been a bitter bone of contention among the Equalization Board's mem-
